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President's Message

It now appears that the Covid variants are largely behind us. As I mentioned in our September newsletter, our next meeting is scheduled for October 16 at 2:00PM at the same place, Good Shepard Lutheran Church on Creedmoor Road in Raleigh. Hope to see you there.

On a personal note, I would like to share that I have recently been granted Norwegian citizenship. In January 2020

Norway became the latest country to permit dual citizenship. This law change meant that I no longer had to relinquish my original Norwegian citizenship when I became an American citizen. That's the good news; the bad news was the surge of new applications. By the time I began the process in April 2020 I was one of 26,000 people who had applied for citizenship as a result of the new law, and the wait list was up 40,000 people.

The waiting time was long for many reasons, including the Coronavirus restrictions that resulted in my Embassy interview being delayed for over 5 months. The case processing was not smooth, with duplicate requests for documentation that reached into late August. They are now working on a planned automation of case processing.

So, why did I go thru all this time and expense? A Norwegian passport is one of the best in the world for freedom of movement. Norwegian citizens have visa free access to 173 countries. (Cuba may be in my travel plans). It also gives me access to Norway's healthcare if I need it during my annual vacations.

I'm happy to provide more detailed information should anyone be interested in doing the same. I look forward to seeing everyone soon.

<u>Lapskaus – Hearty Norwegian Stew Recipe</u>

Lapskaus is best served with lots of <u>flatbrød</u> (flat bread) and sprinkled with freshly chopped parsley – don't leave this out as its flavor here is a fantastic addition and really lifts the dish. And, like most stews, it tastes even better the next day.

Ingredients (serves 6-8)

- 1.3 kg chuck steak (off the bone and trimmed of excess fat), cut into ¾-inch pieces
- 6 large carrots, chopped into ¾-inch pieces
- 300 g parsley roots, chopped into ¾-inch pieces
- 750 g swede (rutabaga), chopped into ¾-inch pieces
- 1 kg floury potatoes such as Kerrs Pink or Maris Piper, chopped into ½-inch cubes
- 1.5 ltr fresh chicken stock
- 30g butter
- Freshly chopped parsley to garnish
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

Method

- 1. Melt the butter in a large casserole pot and brown the meat in batches.
- 2. Add the chopped vegetables and the browned meat, pour over the stock and add some salt and pepper.
- 3. Bring to the boil. You may need to skim the stew a couple of times.
- 4. Cover the casserole with a tight fitting lid and let it simmer gently for 2½ hours, but don't stir too often otherwise the vegetables will turn to mush.
- 5. After 2½ hours or so the meat should be very tender, check and adjust seasoning if necessary. If the stew is too thick you can always thin it out with more stock or water.
- 6. Serve in large bowls, sprinkle with freshly chopped parsley and serve with plenty of of flatbrød.

Ja Vi Elsker: The Norwegian National Anthem

The Norwegian national anthem—known as *nasjonalsangen* in Norwegian—is heard by millions of people around the world at the Olympic games or when Norway's national football teams take to the field. I am of course talking about *Javielsker dette landet*, often referred to simply as *Javielsker*. Within Norway, the song is perhaps most closely associated with the national day celebrations on 17th May.

A new national song—sort of!

Despite these uses, it's only been the official national song of Norway since December 2019. It had been used as the de-facto national anthem for many years, but other songs had also been used. Here is the fascinating story of the Norwegian national song, *Javielsker*.

Lyrics in Norwegian

Ja, vi elsker dette landet, som det stiger frem, furet, værbitt over vannet, med de tusen hjem. Og som fedres kamp har hevet det av nød til seir, også vi, når det blir krevet, for dets fred slår leir. også vi, når det blir krevet, for dets fred, det fred slår leir.

Lyrics in English

Translation is a complex business, especially for songs. What follows is a literal translation of the Norwegian words. There have been efforts to create a more poetic version in English over the years, but there is no official translation.

Yes, we love this country as it rises forth, rugged, weathered, over the water, with the thousands of homes, love, love it and think of our father and mother and the saga-night that lays dreams upon our earth.

Norwegian man in house and cabin, thank your great God! The country he wanted to protect, although things looked dark. All the fights fathers have fought, and the mothers have wept, the Lord has quietly eased so we won our rights.

Yes, we love this country as it rises forth, rugged, weathered, above the sea, with those thousand homes. And as the fathers' struggle has raised it from need to victory, even we, when it is demanded, for its peace will encamp (for defense).

The history of Norway's national anthem

Ja vi elsker has a long history as a nationalist song and song of protest. In the last days of the Norway-Sweden union, Swedish socialists sang the song in support of the Norwegian right to leave the union. 'Ja vi elsker' is often sung to commemorate the signing of the Norwegian constitution in 1814.

During World War II, Norwegian resistance members used the song. It had originally been used by Nazi collaborators as a propaganda song, but the regime eventually banned its use because of its connection to the resistance. Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson began to write the lyrics of what he intended to be a patriotic song around 1859. An accompanying melody was written by his cousin Rikard Nordraak sometime during the winter of 1863-1864.

The song's first public performance took place on 17 May 1864, to mark the 50th anniversary of the Norwegian constitution. Over many decades, *Javi elsker* eventually replaced *Sønner av Norge* (Sons of Norway) as the de-facto national song, but both were used for long periods of time until the early 20th century. In December 2019, Norway officially adopted *Javi elsker* as the official national anthem.

Other national songs in Norway

While Ja vi elsker is commonly heard at sporting events and on the constitution day, there are other national songs used in various situations. As previously mentioned, Sønner av Norge had the title of national song for many decades. Since 2011, Ole Paus' Mitt lille land has been referred to as a "new national song" and it was used several times in connection with the 2011 terror attacks. There is also an unofficial Royal anthem known as Kongesangen, or the King's song. It is played alongside Ja vi elsker on 17 May. Brits will instantly recognize it as the melody is the same as the British national anthem, God Save the Queen.

Oldest Ever Set of Skis Discovered in Norway

Archaeologists in Norway have found a 1,300-year old ski trapped in the ice. It is the matching ski from one found in 2014 and completes the oldest known set in history.

Back in 2014, the Secrets of the Ice research program found a well-preserved ski in the melting ice of Norway. It dated back to before the Viking age and even included the foot binding.



It was a rare find, one of only two skis with a preserved binding found from before the Viking Age. Ever since then, researchers have monitored the ice patch, hoping to find the second ski. Now, the matching ski has been found, and it's in even better condition than the first. Lars Pilø described it as "an unbelievable find."

Secrets of the Ice is a research program run by Norway's Innlandet county. The team investigates several archaeological sites at-risk of damage due to the melting of Norway's glaciers.

Second Digervarden ski

The newly-discovered ski measures 187cm long and up to 17cm wide. As it was found 4-5cm further into the ice, it's better preserved than the previous ski. This is likely the reason that the 'new' ski is actually 17cm longer than the original.

This could mean a missing piece remains in the ice, or it could simply be a mismatch. Skis were not mass produced 1,300 years ago!

The new ski isn't just a preserved plank of wood, however! Three twisted birch bindings, a leather strap and a wooden plug feature in the new ski. The original ski just had one birch binding and a leather strap.

Lars Pilø explained more: "The foothold of the new ski shows repairs, so it was well used. A part of the back end of the ski is missing. The missing piece is presumably still inside the ice. Whether it broke when lost or while inside the ice may be possible to say at a later stage based on a careful study of the edge of the break."

The ski discovery

Just a few weeks ago, archaeologist Runar Hole and his colleague Bjørn Hessen found the second ski just five meters from where the first one was found in 2014.

The ski was firmly encased in the ice, so the team had to leave it behind. A mountain storm and then fresh snowfall hampered efforts to return, but eventually the team was able to return and retrieve the ski before the winter fully arrived.

On 26 September, an expedition team complete with ice axes, gas cookers and packing material set out to Mount Digervarden. Their objective? To free the ski from the ice and transport it back safely.
